The concept of pastoralism has been used by humans for thousands of years for livestock breeding and landscape conservancy. Throughout history, the importance of pastoralism has changed significantly, as has the environmental, economic and political context in which pastoralism is embedded. In heavily industrialized societies in particular, traditional forms of animal husbandry and land use are becoming less important, even though they have important potential, for example for landscape conservation and environmental and climate protection.

With events on „Pastoralism today" INFOE wants to focus on the current situation of herders worldwide

and draw attention to current challenges and problems. We have invited sheep and goat herders from Cologne, Simon Peter Longoli from the Karamoja Development Forum in Uganda as well as other international pastoralist experts. Karamoja is a rural region in north-eastern Uganda with an economy heavily based on cattle farming and is affected by current processes such as climate change and political tensions. With the contributions of our international guests we would like to present different perspectives and experiences, exchange ideas and discuss the potential of pastoralism in the face of today's challenges for a social and ecological transformation.




